### Loss of Local Leader Brings Fond Memories

Lemuel Baylis Carnes, III, pictured at left as a young man, was a Davenport pioneer, entrepreneur,

and a leader in everything he endeavored. He passed away on February 25, 2024, at the age of 89, and was just being recognized by the Davenport community as a quintessential leader of his time. He was voted Pioneer of the Year by the DHS in the Fall of 2023 and had a permanent exhibit constructed at The Davenport Museum in his name. He was also Davenport's Grand Marshal at the city's 2023 Christmas parade.

Baylis Carnes, III, was the CEO of the multimillion-dollar enterprise known as Standard Sand & Silica, which is just at the edge of the Davenport city limits. Lemuel Carnes, II, his dad, started Standard Sand with used equipment from the phosphate mines. The Carnes family has been in Davenport since 1944, when Carnes, senior, prospected and found the area suitable for the sand mine he dreamed of starting. Baylis was 11 when they arrived here. The company was founded in 1945.

Just for perspective, the City of Davenport (it is estimated) had a population of less than 1,000 when Standard arrived in town. Today that population is over 19,000. Also, when Standard started, rail was the only

mode of transportation of their products. Today, that mode also includes trucking. Lots of it. It's been said that, like the Holly Hill Fruit Products company, Standard Sand helped "build" Davenport in the early days, meaning that they employed a sizeable chunk of the city's population.

From when he was young, Baylis

had always demonstrated the char-

acteristics that made him a leader.
The description under his High School Senior picture read, "He was not merely a chip off the old block; he was the old block himself," predicting the true leader he'd become as an adult.

He played the trumpet, played in the Haines City High School marching band, served as class president his junior year, and held office in 4 -H, Student Council, and the Key Club. To top it off, he was also a pitcher his last two years of high school, after which he took himself to the University of Alabama's School of Mining Engineering. But tragedy awaited him mid-way into his university education.

Baylis inherited Standard Sand by happenstance when he was 20 years old, when his father passed away suddenly at age 52. The last words Baylis heard from his father was "just remember, when one fellow leaves off, another has to begin." It made an indelible mark on his young, entrepreneurial mind but challenges awaited him, and in the way he treated being a CEO.

Upon taking over Standard, the first thing some of the older workers did was quit. They didn't want a 20-something telling them what to do, but Baylis was a smart cookie. He took over the company with the workers who were left — all 15 of them. With the support of his spunky, courageous and gutsy mother, who encouraged the capitalist spirit in both Baylis the elder and, now, the younger, he prospered the business into the \$58-million business that it is today.

A quality not seen in many of CEO's was one of equity. Baylis did not consider the people who worked for him to be lesser than him. It was said that he paid his workers well and treated them like an extension to his own family.

It's even seen in the Standard Sand logo, as seen at right.

There are over 250 employees at Standard spread across Florida and Georgia



with many in Lake Wales and Davenport. It's home is Davenport.

### **Butterfly Buddies to Meet**


Butterfly Buddies is a group of people who love butterflies and wish to help Mother Nature overcome the adversities of habitat loss. Their next meeting at The Museum will be on Saturday, June 8<sup>th</sup> from 10 to 11:30 AM.

At its last meeting, the members learned about the Florida oblong twinflower, which, according to resident Delores "Lori" Moffett, dominated the land-

scape in Davenport decades ago, as it was a Florida native.

Now you can barely find it in landscapes but it's not extinct.

The twinflower, shown at left, is called so because its flowers are born in pairs. It's scientific name is Dyschoriste oblongifolia and it is the host of the Common Buckeye, a butterfly that can be found in all of Florida, and which eats both leaves and flowers and may be seen on the plants year-round and especially in fall.

The following poem was written by VFW George D. Gordon, III, pictured at right, for the DHS Memorial Day event.


When tomorrow starts without me And I'm not there to see If the sun should rise and find your eyes all filled with tears for me.


### An Event to Remember

The 2024 Memorial Day event was one to remember our fallen soldiers and we did when we recognized, by name, the six soldiers from Polk County who made the ultimate sacrifice, serving in the Iraq and Afghanistan wars. They were:

- Army Spc. Ryan M. Lumley
- Army Staff Sgt. John A. Reiners
- Marine Cpl. Ronald R. Payne, Jr.
- Army Sgt. Keith A. Coe
- Navy Petty Officer 3rd Class Ronald A. Ginther

Following is the speech given by DHS president Freida Priest.

"I wouldn't want to lose this opportunity to remind everyone that we are standing in the historical Wilson Park. Mr. Lorenzo Wilson was one of the founding fathers of Holly Hill Fruit Products, Inc., and lived in the house on the corner, the Delson House.





History is important because it reminds us where we have been as a city and a nation. The United States has been built on citizens who have given their all so we can enjoy the freedom we have today.

The monument you see here is an example is a man who was willing to serve his country, which earned him the medal of honor

during World War II. James Hendrix, pictured above, survived WWII and the Korean War. He retired in 1965 as a Master Sergeant. The city lost this hero to throat cancer in 2002.

Heroes have qualities that they might not realize they have. They usually see something that needs to be done and they do it without

thought of harm to themselves. The job has to be done so when Mr. Hendrix captured 13 Germans and rescued his fellow soldier, he later quoted 'I wasn't being brave, and if I had ever heard of the Medal of Honor, I didn't pay it no mind.' A fellow just figured if it's his time, it's his time and that is all there is to it.

These are the types of things that we should never forget and I'm so glad we have been reminded every year since the Civil War that freedom comes at a price. Some give it their all and not to honor them would be as if their lives didn't matter. Human life is very pre-
